EC 881 Labor Economics II	Theories and empirical evidence of the human capital model and alternatives to the human capital model. Economics of discrimination and gender differences in labor markets. FM 580 Special Topics in Family Medicine	Exploration of special aspects of family practice. Examples include ethnicity and aging, clinical nutrition, sports medicine, death and dying, health care of women, research methods in primary care.	1-3 cr, Hours arranged. HM 854 Health Equity Framework For Public Health Practice	Social justice and health equity framework for the practice of public health with analysis of persistent health disparity across race, class, gender, and other forms of difference.	3 Cr, Hours (42) Arraigned online.	Open to students in the Public Health major or in the Public Health Specialization or approval of college.
HST 850 (002) Comparative History of Sexuality, Health, Illness	The course explores issues of gender, sexuality, and health/illness in the contexts of the rise of nation states, colonialism, and post-colonialism, with a focus on pertinent areas of conflict and controversy such as reproduction, sexual experiences outside marriage, non-binary sexual and gender identities, sexually transmitted diseases, and war-related violence, illness, and medicine.	3 Cr, Monday, 4:10pm- 7:00pm	
HM 873 Maternal and Child Health: A Global Public Health Perspective	Introduction to historical and cultural foundations of maternal and child global public health. Health care needs, health determinants and disparities, programs, policies and public health issues affecting women and children.	3 cr, Hours arranged (42). Online. ISE 870 Teaching College Science	Philosophies of education. Ethnic, gender, and cultural issues. Designing a laboratory course. Problems of class size. Instructional technologies. Assessment and evaluation.	2 cr, M, 11:30am- 1:20pm	Approval of college.

LLT 846 English Structures and Functions	Phonological, morphological, grammatical, lexical, discourse and pragmatic systems of English, including historical origins and social, regional, and gender variations. Application to the teaching of English to speakers of other languages.	3 cr, W, 3:00-5:50pm	Only open to masters students in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major.
OST 574 Female Reproductive System	Normal structure and function and pathologies related to the female reproductive system. Integration of basic science and clinical information in obstetrics and gynecology.	3 cr, There are multiple sections available. PSY 992 Seminar in Psychology	Topic: Psychology of Gender. Section 607	3 cr, There are 4 sections available.	
SW 822 Topics in Policy Practice and Advocacy	Information and skills for policy practice for advocacy at local, community, agency, state and federal levels. National and international policy comparisons. Focus on women and other disadvantaged groups	3 Cr, There are 9 sections available.	
WRA 882 Contemporary Theories of Rhetoric	Modern, postmodern, and contemporary rhetoric theories and their impact on writing and writing instruction. Cultural studies, critical theory, feminist discourse theory, rhetorical ethics, visual rhetoric, digital and media theory.	3 cr, W, 6:00-8:50pm	Open to grad/masters/doctoral students in English, Professional Writing, or Rhetoric and Writing.
WRA 891 Rhetorics of Visual and Graphic Media	Comics are one of the most influential forms of media, and have been for decades. In this course, our main focus will be on comics, and the nature of the class will be exploratory. We will examine the cultural meaning making (the rhetoric) of comics as well as other graphic media forms (graphic novels, propaganda, advertising) with a specific focus on gender. This will include learning the basic history of the medium as well as reading and examining lots of comics, graphic novels, and other graphic media forms.	3 cr, M, 6:00-8:50pm	Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.
