

Building on MSU's rich history of education, research, and extension, particularly in relation to agriculture, rural areas, environment, and natural resources, GJEC is the first program of its kind to focus on local and global intersections of gender, social and environmental justice, and environmental change.

The program offers graduate students a supportive and rigorous academic environment for engaging in interdisciplinary research on these issues. The program is designed to:

- provide students from different disciplinary backgrounds with analytical and methodological tools to address environmental and natural resource issues from gender and social justice perspectives;
- provide students with a global perspective on environmental and agricultural issues; and
- foster the growth of research, service, and interdisciplinary collaboration.

Potential areas of scholarship that focus on the intersections of gender, class, race, and ethnicity include:

- environmental politics of international issues, such as biotechnology and globalization;
- grassroots environmental justice movements;
- use and management of natural resources;
- feminist political economy; and
- human-environment relations in history and literature.
