Round Table: Women's and Gender Studies in Turkey

March 20

1:30pm-3:00pm, 201 International Center

In recent years there has been a major increase in the number of programs devoted to Women's and Gender Studies within Turkey. From the outside, this appears to be an entirely positive development. Within Turkey, however, conversations among academics reveal significant measures of concern and anxiety over this trend. Indeed, some Turkish scholars depict these programs' establishment, organizational structure, and even their names as expressions of the current government's conservative agenda. This presentation provides an overview of Women's and Gender Studies programs within Turkey, past and present. Based upon this survey of historical developments and ongoing trends, the potential for collaborative projects with Turkish institutions of higher education is then assessed. This appraisal is based largely on observations derived from an MSU Strategic Partnership inquiry of various public and private universities in Istanbul and Izmir that was conducted during Summer 2014 by the MSU faculty participating in this presentation. There will be a round-table consisting of presentations from participants, followed by opportunities for questions-and-answers and discussion. Participants will include Emine Ö. Evered, PhD (Associate Professor of History), Michelle Kaminski, PhD (Associate Professor of Human Resources & Labor Relations), Stacy Hickox, J.D. (Assistant Professor of Human Resources & Labor Relations), Hannah Brenner, J.D. (Lecturer in Law, College of Law).

When Sade meets French Porno-Punk: The Marquis and Virginie Despentes April 17

This presentation will analyze how Sade's materialism allows for the development of the queer "liberated woman" as she is depicted in Virginie Despentes's novel *Baise-moi*. The presentation will focus on sexuality, transgression and knowledge acquisition in Despentes's novel, and examine how these aspects are linked to Sade's transgressive philosophy of materialism. The materialistic quest of knowledge depicted in Sade's and Despentes's works challenges the concept of heteronormativity, since it is not restrained by any gender norms. Valentina Denzel is an Assistant Professor of French Literature (17th and 18th century) in the Department of Romance and Classical Studies at Michigan State University. Her fields of interest are Italian and French Literature (15th–18th century), Queer and Gender Studies, Narratology, Possible World Theory, Relation between fiction and reality, and *Querelle des femmes*. She has published several articles in this field of research. She teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in French literature and language. This event is free and open to the public.

Intentional Parenthood's Promise: Redefining Legal Parentage for the 21st Century Webinar February 18

Who is a legal parent? The answer used to be fairly straightforward. For instance, a woman who gave birth to a child was presumed the legal and genetic mother of the child. The increased use of assisted reproductive technology ("ART") means that a birth mother may not necessarily be the child's legal or genetic mother. Rather, a gestational surrogate may have been implanted with an embryo created by the sperm and oocyte of donors for a couple who wishes to parent the child. Courts have slowly begun to embrace intentional parenthood doctrine; that is, the person who intends to parent the child and engaged in actions that resulted in the child's birth (such as hiring a surrogate) is the child's legal parent. Most states have laws that provide that a sperm or oocyte donor is not a child's legal parent, but application of those laws varies due to jurisdictional differences, complicated facts, or variance with other laws. Although intentional parentage has been used in some jurisdictions to determine legal parentage, its embrace is far from uniform. Should all jurisdictions employ intentional parenthood doctrine? If so, what impact will (should) intentional parenthood doctrine have for families that do not use ART? Lecture will be given by Professor Melanie B. Jacobs, Associate Dean for Graduate and International Programs at MSU College of Law.

What People Mean When They Say "I Can't Do That, It Violates My Conscience" Webinar April 15

"Conscience clause" legislation, first enacted following Roe v. Wade, intends to protect a health care provider's (HCP) right to refuse services on the basis of conscience. And yet, 40 years later, the precise meaning of conscience is not well understood. When conscience is defined, it is in abstract, theoretical terms that are removed from the meaning of conscience in day-to-day practice. We use a sociological perspective to challenge this asocial depiction: while individuals act on their consciences, one's conscience has a social basis. Using interviews with 61 care providers we identify the social basis of conscience and how health care providers understand it in their everyday practice, examining the conditions under which conscience is invoked in the process of deciding whether or not to perform a medical procedure.
