The author's research in Tanout, Niger, has shown that resources, rights, and responsibilities in pastoralist households are gendered in negotiable partnerships between hearthholders and chief herders. Through a successful partnership, essential for the viability of household enterprises, wife, husband, and children benefit from livestock and dairy production to maintain the household's overall well-being. Correspondingly, this paper illustrates that programs that disregard these partnerships and household/herd integrity risk failure and harm to project participants. Knowing in Space: Three Lessons from US Black Women's Social Theory

In attempting to create a US Black feminist philosophy, Professor Dotson has uncovered three lessons in US Black women's social theory. They are the following: **1**) oppression is a multistable, social phenomenon; **2**) many US Black women identify occupying a negative, socio-epistemic space as part of their experience of oppression; and **3**) addressing oppression for many black women will require grappling with politics of social spatiality. These insights are by no means new. However, the fact that these tropes can be identified in almost 200 years of black women's social theory in the US is far more distinctive than many allow. In this presentation, Dotson will offer an articulation of each of these three lessons concerning social oppression and begin a discussion about US Black feminist philosophy.

Lowering Rates of Preterm Delivery: A Major Public Health Challenge

Preterm birth is a major cause of infant mortality and later child morbidity. Rates of preterm delivery are highest among poor women and African-American women, making this a key health disparity problem. Despite its public health importance, we have made little progress in lowering the rates of preterm delivery in the U.S.A. This presentation reviews the challenges investigators face in studying this complex outcome and in developing successful interventions. It also highlights a research approach and findings from the POUCH Study, an MSU-initiated study that enrolled 3,019 pregnant women from 5 Michigan communities (1998-2004) to identify biologic and social factors related to risk of preterm delivery.

Health Disparities Among Same-Sex Couples

A legacy of research finds that marriage is associated with good health. Yet, same-sex cohabiters cannot marry in most states in the U.S., and therefore may not receive the health benefits associated with marriage. This study utilizes pooled data from the 1997-2009 National Health Interview Surveys to compare the self-rated health of same-sex cohabiting men (n = 1,659) and same-sex cohabiting women (n = 1,634) with that of their different-sex married, different-sex cohabiting, and unpartnered divorced, widowed, and never married counterparts. Results from logistic regression models show that same-sex cohabiters report poorer health than their different-sex married counterparts at the same levels of socioeconomic status. Additionally, same-sex cohabiters report better health than their different-sex cohabiting and single counterparts, but these differences are fully explained by socioeconomic status. Without their socioeconomic advantages, same-sex cohabiters would report similar health to those non-married groups. Analyses further reveal important racial-ethnic and gender variations.

During the 1960s, as the executive director of the National Urban League, Whitney Young was one of the few African Americans who had the ears of those controlling the levers of power, including Fortune 500 CEOs, governors, senators and presidents. He used these relationships to gain better access to employment, education, housing and healthcare for African Americans, other minorities and those in need. His unique position and approach earned him praise, but also scorn from the Black Power movement for being too close to the white establishment. While he is less known today than other leaders of the era because of the behind-the-scenes nature of his work, Young's legacy and influence are still felt profoundly.

Immediately following the screening of a segment from the "Independent Lens" documentary, Renee Canady will moderate a discussion on the issues in the film with Willard K. Walker and Tremaine Phillips. Walker was the recipient of the first Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Legacy Award, presented by the Greater Lansing Area Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday Commission. Phillips is Director for Innovation and Region Building for the Prima Civitas Foundation. A graduate of MSU, Phillips earned a degree in Environmental Economics and Policy. Canady is the Health Officer for Ingham County and serves as Director of the Ingham County Health Department. She has served as researcher, advocate, educator, trainer and facilitator in the areas of health disparities, inequities, cultural competence and social justice.

The theme of the conference addresses ongoing gender equality politics as well as legislation against gender discrimination as part of transnational transformations. The concepts of human rights, gender equality and anti-discrimination legislation have gradually become more and more accepted on a comprehensive global level and have been given a prominent position in the official rhetoric. In most Western states, gender equality politics and "state feminism" have become a self-evident part of political development, including legislation, gender equality reforms, measures and institutions such as gender equality ombudsmen. However, the criticisms of the concepts of human rights, gender equality and anti-discrimination as colonial, racial and Western concepts expose the complexities and ambivalences that are embedded in gender equality politics? Do the politics in this field maintain or challenge existing power relations and structures? Or, is the problem the concept of gender equality itself? What political ideologies and interests have interfered with the development of this concept? What lines of conflict are evident? Are gender equality politics and anti-discrimination legislation to be seen as the outcome of a socialist/social democratic ideology or as a result of a neo-liberal influenced political agenda?

This conference is meant to be a moment for critical investigation as well as for understanding historical contexts of gender politics in different countries. Our intention is to examine the origins, genealogy, evolution, historical contexts and what might be seen as a backlash for the feminism and gender equality politics of today. We also wish to examine the concept of gender equality politics and the political institution of gender equality ombudsmen. Above all we want to highlight gender equality politics, strategies and anti-discrimination legislation as a component in, or an idea of, transnational movements, both historically and today. We also welcome contributions that examine gender equality politics from an intersectional point of view. We invite all modes of work, papers and critical thinking on gender equality politics and gender discrimination in a globalized world. We especially invite papers on non-Western and post-authoritarian

gender equality politics and legislation. Our main questions are: How is gender equality interpreted, and what are the political consequences of these interpretation processes? How do ideas of gender equality politics and anti-discrimination legislation spread globally? How is the concept of gender equality politics approached in politics and legislation? How are the politics of gender equality situated in national politics of human rights? How does gender discrimination intersect with other types of discrimination?

The Center mission is to promote, support, and disseminate research focused on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender equality and human rights. The Center is dedicated to the advancement of Equality by connecting academic, evidence based research to community action, public policy, and curricular innovation. The goal of the Research Awards program is to stimulate LGBT public policy oriented academic research in the Social Sciences, Communication and Media Arts, Human Services, Education, and Arts disciplines.
